

Reception Home Learning - 22.02.21

<p><b>English – This week's story is:</b> The Enormous Turnip. Listen to Mrs Jones read the story: <a href="https://youtu.be/Yb-YknV2fz0">https://youtu.be/Yb-YknV2fz0</a>          Watch an animated version: <a href="https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=mGw5yTOPTSQ">https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=mGw5yTOPTSQ</a>          Book Talk/Discussion questions: <a href="#">Where was the turnip?</a> <a href="#">Why did the turnip not come out?</a> <a href="#">Why did it finally come out when the mouse helped, was the mouse the strongest?</a>          Read the story and talk about what plants need to grow. Talk about the importance of vegetables/fruit and what it means to be healthy. Talk about the importance of teamwork, how important it is to help each other and about the characters' feelings.</p>			
<p>Make a puppet theatre with characters from the story and act out what happens.          Can you retell the story with the repeated parts? Can you make up what happens after the story?</p>	<p>Choose someone from your family to be in the 'hot-seat', where they are a character from the story. Ask the character some questions such as asking the farmer "How did you feel when you tried to pull it up on your own?" or asking the boy "Why did you help?". Swap places and characters with people in your family!</p>	<p>Sequence the story pictures/characters in the correct order to make your own book. Add a label or caption for each part of the story. Try to hear the sounds in the words you want to write or use your RWInc mat to help you.</p>	<p>Help to write a shopping list of ingredients. This week's challenge is to make vegetable soup. Can you help Mum or Dad write a shopping list for the things you will need?</p>

You have a bingo board in your pack.  <u>This week's maths activity focus:</u> language of size and money.  <b>Size order...</b>          Can you cut and stick the turnips in order starting from smallest to largest?</p>  <p><b>Make a vegetable shop at home...</b>          Make price tags or price lists for a range of vegetables at home. There are some blank ones in your pack. Take turns to be the customer and the shop keeper. Count out 1p coins to buy the vegetables. What if I buy two vegetables, how much will that be all together? This will also create opportunities for size language if you include different sized vegetables e.g please can I buy that small carrot and that large potato? How much will that be altogether?</p>		<p><b>Phonics /Keywords:</b> We will send daily phonics videos/activity links through Marvellous me this week. <b>Our focus sounds are ar, or.</b> We don't teach ur as a sound at this stage but it may be useful to point out the special friends ur in t-ur-nip. The focus for this week is <b>keywords: I, the, my, you, said. Keywords hide and seek...</b>          Use the large keyword cards in your pack this week. Hide them around the house. 1,2,3,4,5 search! Can your child find and read the words hidden around the house. Take turns to hide and find them to keep the children motivated to play. Can they check if the adult is right when it is their time to read?</p> <p><b>Creative</b>          Make an enormous turnip – Paper Mache          There are some balloons in your pack if would like to do this challenge.          Can you paint a picture of the enormous turnip?</p>    <p><b>Make your own vegetable art!</b> Use pieces of fruit or vegetables to make a face or a picture. Don't forget to take a picture to email your creation before you eat it!</p> 	
<p><b>PSE</b>          In the 'Enormous Turnip', the team have to work together to pull the turnip out of the ground. What other activities or jobs around the house need team work? Can you help someone at home with a job/chore to make a good team?  <b>Fun Friday</b>          Friday's will be Fun Fridays from now on. Please select some activities from the sheet attached in your pack to complete on a Friday and join us for our class get together each Friday on Teams video call. Children will share what they have been doing, join in with a fun game and socialise with their friends. The Teams meetings on a Friday will also be Head Teacher's award and reward time!</p>		<p><b>Cooking:</b>          Use the recipe card in this pack or use the internet to find your own simple vegetable soup recipe.          Carefully peel, grate or chop the vegetables with a grown up and cook them in a nice warm soup!          Adults: It is important to talk about all of the actions when cooking with children. This will help develop new vocabulary such as grate, chop, cut, slice, boil, pour, stir.</p> <p><b>Understanding of the World</b>          In the story, the farmer pulls the turnip. What can you find around your home that you need to pull to work/turn on? Is there anything that needs a push to work?          Make a list of push and pull things around your house with words or pictures.</p>	

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
