What a fantastic day with Rob from Zoo lab!

This week we welcomed Rob from Zoolab. He talked to Years Five and Six about how creatures around the world are having to adapt to survive. He explained why us humans are responsible for this by not recycling enough and by chopping down huge swathes of rainforests. He brought a tropical rain frog, a millipede and a cockroach as examples for us to hold. He also brought his two pet rats, which he described as the world's cleanest animals, as they eat human rubbish dumped in landfill sites. We were left thinking-How can we be better at recycling at school and at home?



Years Three and Four had a different experience with Rob. Our science later in the year is all about the structure of the human body and how we use muscles and bones to move. With this in mind, we discovered the different ways numerous animals moved and how different they all are. We had a memorable experience of holding these animals including a python, giant snail, Madagascan cockroach and two rats. We were amazed by how the python (and other snakes) use their muscles to move.
