Children will be grouped accordingly to ensure that tailored teaching can be carried out which suits the needs of the individual child and their current phase of learning. Alongside this, children use the 'RWI Ditty' books to promote their segmenting and blending skills, listening skills, knowledge of gathering information using visual cues to identify words in texts and also to overall develop confidence and to promote the love of reading.
